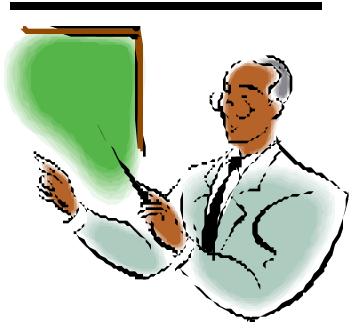

Karl Moore (McGill University) and David Lewis (Citrus College) have a new paper in the McGill University, Faculty of Management working paper series, *The Role of Government in Ancient Rome and Legionary Capitalism*. It may be obtained from Karl at Karl.Moore@mcgill.ca. A later version of the paper was accepted for presentation and publication at the ASAC conference to be held in Winnipeg in June. A second edition of their 1999 book, *Birth of the Multinational: 2000 Years of Ancient Business History* will be published in 2002.
